Ecological restoration projects may appear to begin on planting or seeding day, but long before that, the seeds needed to be sourced. Moreover, we can hope that a restored site could, as time passes, become a seed source itself. Thus, we find no beginning or end, but a never-ending cycle, a pattern familiar and repeated throughout ecology. In this session, experts will share different parts of this restoration cycle, touching on their work, their relationships with each other and how they see this wheel turning for generations into the future.


